Picture this, you set out on a long backpacking hike by yourself, on a trail you've never been before, and it's towards the evening. Your plan was to set up your tent just before it got dark, but as it became darker you realize that there is nowhere to set up a tent because you are on a thin trail on the side of a thick forest mountain where it is steep on both sides of the trail, no flat ground. So, you pull out your trusty headlamp flashlight and continue hiking. Even though it is pitch dark and maybe even a little scary all around you, with your bright headlamp you can see the trail just fine.

Sometimes life can be a little like that.

You can feel like you're headed into an unknown future that is dark and scary. The world and its darkness can be overwhelming. Uncertainty and tragedy can fill us with despair and anxiety. He'll light the way.
